Society Weekend in York, 15th - 17th July 2011

Members of the Society, wives and friends met in the Knavesmire Manor Hotel in York for what turned out to be a wonderful weekend. The Hotel was excellent, the food superb and the company scintillating. Our weekend started on the Friday with a visit to the York Stamp Fair, probably the best Stamp Fair in the United Kingdom, with British, Dutch and German dealers. In the evening Yvonne welcomed us to the Society Weekend which was followed by a magnificent meal. Later over coffee in the lounge we were able to informally discuss our day's acquisitions.

On the following day after breakfast, the programme started with a display by Edward Klempka on the Czech Army in Siberia and the Ukraine in the 1st World War and mail from Czechs in exile during the 2nd World War. We were informed that the Czech Army in Russia consisted of ex-prisoners of war that were recruited, under very favourable terms, to guard the railways against insurgents of the Red Army. We were treated to a vibrant display of stamps; covers; censored mail and vignettes, much of which was very rare indeed. In the second half Edward introduced us to mail to and from the Czech Army in exile, with again some fabulous material, much of which we have never seen before. We all agreed that fine Edwards display was supplemented with clear precise descriptions of his material, coupled with wonderful anecdotes of the times. After a resounding show of appreciation by our members, Brian Day gave a vote of thanks.

After coffee there was a "Workshop on Literature". Members could discuss books and/or websites that they had found useful. It was obvious from the outset that most of us thirst for knowledge on our chosen subject but we don't first see if the Society Library has the information that we desire. This was borne out by our librarian Lindy Bosworth who has very few requests to borrow books from the society's very extensive collection. Several of our members had brought with them books that they had found interesting with subjects that included the Hapsburg Monarchy until 1912, Czech Airmails of 1930, Munich 1938, Pre Stamp Austria, Czech Postal Rates of 1950, The German Occupation of Austria 1938, Czech and Slovak Catalogues, A Map of Hungarian Military Districts and Airmail Monthly Magazines. Without fail all of us thought that this was a very useful seminar.

After lunch entries for the George Pearson Trophy and the Francis Pettit Salver were mounted and later secretly scored by those present.

This was followed by members' displays which included The Apple Tree of Gablonz, Space Research, postage Dues, The Czech Army in Exile in WW2, Postal Stationery pre 1900, Jasina, the Last Outpost of Czechoslovakia, Slovakia 1939-45 Postal Stationery, Some Aspects of Slovakia, 1934 Postal Stationery, Slogan Cancels, Civil Censors of Moravia 1914-18, 3 Colour Cancels, Hradčany and lastly the 1st Republic. As you can see there was a wonderful array of subjects.

After a sumptuous dinner Colin Spong gave us the Bill Dawson Memorial Lecture. Colin entertained us with graphic descriptions of people that he has met during his time editing our Monographs. His clear imagery along with photographs and quotes brought to life many of the characters that most of us had only heard about. It was a really good talk and I for one would love to hear it again.

In the morning of our last day Keith Brandon was invited to talk on how to decipher early Austrian pre-stamp covers. This was a scintillating talk which aroused those little grey cells. Keith brought to life pre-stamp covers that, in his words, look rather uninteresting. This is mainly due to us not being able to read the old German writing. Keith took us through how to decipher the script, with the aid of a list of the old German alphabet, how to identify the sender by studying of the seal on the reverse, to recognise the area that the letter was sent to and the precipitant. Keith's display and presentation was so interesting he brought this little known area of collecting into a new light.

Keith's talk was followed by two more members' displays of Postal Censorship in Czechoslovakia in the Munich Crisis and Olomouc.

Yvonne then announced the winners of the two competitions as follows:

The George Pearson Trophy

Tony Moseley for his display of Provisional German Propaganda

Cancels, Postcards and Local Overprints from the Glass-Making

Region of Northern Bohemia – October 1938.

The Francis Pettit Salver Richard Wheatley for War Hero Stamps of 1945–1948.

The George Pearson Trophy and Francis Pettit Salver Competitions held at our York Weekend 2011

Tony Moseley was the worthy winner of the George Pearson Trophy with his entry *Provisional German Propaganda Cancels, Postcards and Local Overprints from the glass-making region of Northern Bohemia – October 1938.*

I am particularly pleased that Tony won as he supported both competitions last time they were held, but as he was the only entry in the Salver competition, that competition could not be held.

The winner of the Francis Pettit Salver was Richard Wheatley with War Hero Stamps 1945-1948.

All the entries were of a high standard and I hope those members who were not successful this time will enter again. It will be good to receive even more entries in 2013.

I would also like to congratulate **Roy Reader** for winning the Bill Dawson Literature Award 2009 – 2010 with his worthy article **The 1944 ČSR Overprints on French Stamps** Czechout 2/2010 page 47.

Congratulations to:

Les Pearcy, who won the Social Class for his entry *Thomas Garrigue Masaryk, The First President of Czechoslovakia* in the Phoenix Trophy Competition, an inter-society competition, where he represented Matlock.

Jan Verlag, who was awarded the Silver Society Pin by the Society of Czechoslovak Philately in the Netherlands to honour him for devoting his knowledge and experience to the Society.

Bill Hedley, who entered HUNFILA, a Hungarian exhibition with participation from the neighbouring countries plus a few foreign exhibits, and whose entry, *Postal Service Development in Hungary before 1900, with special reference to Pozsony and its environs*, won a Gold Medal and a special prize, a huge vase. His next goal is to extend it to eight frames and we wish him every success with his endeavours.

On Saturday 15 October 2011 **Bob Hill** will be delivering a lecture entitled **Revolutionary Issues 1944 – 1945** to the Postal History Society of the Czech Republic at Vysoké Mýto Regional Museum. This is part of the first Czech – Slovak Philatelic Exhibition referred to in *Czechout* 1/2011 page 3. It is a great credit to our Society to have been asked to deliver this lecture.

Lubor Kunc, the Chairman of the Postal History Society of Czechoslovakia, will be speaking at the same event on the subject of *Field Post of Czechoslovak Forces in France, GB and Czechoslovakia* 1944 – 1945.

John Leonard Whiteside 9.1.1939 – 23.5.2011

It was with sadness that I heard of John's death; we had been friends for many years since we first met at the Leicester 1975 Philatelic Congress of Great Britain. I think it was the fact that when he discovered I had been in the RAF in Driffield and used to go into Bridlington at weekends. A chance remark that a family who had welcomed me into their home, had introduced me to a good friend of theirs, the local chemist Mr Maynard Whiteside, cemented our friendship.



John was a single man, who lived on his own terms and was Yorkshire through and through. Apart from Yorkshire County Cricket Club, there were two other important sides to John's life: his family and his abiding passion for philately.

John was born in Bridlington on 9 January, 1939, the son of Maynard and Ivy Whiteside. He and his younger brother, Peter, were brought up in this attractive seaside resort and John attended Bridlington Boys Grammar School. From an early age, he demonstrated a ready felicity with numbers and he went on to concentrate on science subjects and to read Chemistry at Manchester University. He specialised in the extraction of gas from coal and, on graduating, worked as an engineer in Birmingham. As the impact of the discovery of North Sea Gas changed the nature of the industry's supply network, John's mathematical skills once again came into play and he became a works study specialist at an engineering firm in Leeds, living first in Harrogate and later Leeds. By the end of his career, he was an acknowledged expert in pension and redundancy arrangements, the essential person to retain in a constantly downsizing firm.

He had an encyclopaedic knowledge of history, postal history, rates and many aspects of what some people call the back of the book collecting. He jointly authored significant papers and was generous with helping many with their queries with great detail and accuracy. John could be single minded, stubborn but admirable with it. He did not always suffer fools gladly, but would always come up with an answer to their questions. He formed a number of significant collections including Afghanistan, Danzig, Sudetenland Commercial mail, India Revenues, French Bureaux de Passe; and was a member of many societies over the years, Czechoslovak PS, France & Colonies, Germany & Colonies, India Study Circle but gradually in the last years he concentrated on interests with the Austria PS, Hungarian PS and Revenue Society apart from being a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society and the Society of Postal Historians

For many years he used to drive his Robin Reliant down to Sussex and stay with Pat and myself combining it with many displays, until ill health forced him to give up driving. John's death was quite sudden. Although his health was failing in his last year, he was still able to attend the Society of Postal Historians conference at Buxton as recently as late April. His death from a heart attack was unexpected and, perhaps mercifully, without an overlong period of suffering. So that I shall miss those monthly phone calls, made on his terms, he liked to use his BT weekend slot!

A Note from your Auction Secretary - Peter Williams

A member's recent comment has prompted me to remind all members that there is a range of services available to you all before and after each auction.

I prefer to look at items before bidding for them. There is a risk that bidding for an item "unseen" may result in the receipt of an item that was something other than you thought. The item may be defective or not exactly what you wanted.

You can contact me by e-mail, phone or letter to request details of any lots that interest you. Contact details are in Czechout (the inside front cover) and on the internet. I can send colour scans by e-mail free of charge, or by post for a nominal charge. Try to avoid the last couple of days before the auction as I plan to complete a draft "sort" so that the Friday is devoted to packing and posting - the most time consuming activity. This allows me to send the items to everyone on Friday so that you can receive them on Saturday - Post Office deliveries willing (that means you Wombourne Post Office).

In the past I have selected a number of higher valued items for scans. For the last auction, I provided scans on request. This allowed members to customise their requests. For example, do you want to see the front and reverse of a cover? Where the lot is large, I will select key items to give a flavour of the whole. If you are interested in particular items, let me know.

I would like to remind all members that if you are unhappy with your lot, for whatever reason, then there is a **no quibble refund policy**. Simply let me know why you wish to return the item so that I can advise the vendor and return it to me for a full refund or reduce your payment by the amount of the lot.

Our auction is one of the largest and most frequent amongst the specialist societies. Many have higher minimum value lots that I have – members have expressed favourable opinions on this in the past.

I have reduced the number of lots recently as I can only offer what I am offered. If lots are resubmitted, there is at least a 20% reduction in the reserve to attract interest.

Have you any areas that no longer interest you? Do you know of any fellow collectors who are thinking of disposing their collections of anything from the Czech lands?



Recently, I saw an announcement in a philatelic magazine that again, a stamp exhibition would take place in Japan.

This of course brought back to me the very unpleasant experience I had – when participating at Tokyo Philanippon 1991, two of my stamps: a 50/50 Postage Due error overprint and a 4 K granite paper Posta 1919 were stolen.

The philatelic press warned against buying these stolen stamps, but neither of these stamps ever resurfaced on the open market or appeared at auction. Experts like Pavel Pitterman. Jan Karasek, Fischmeister, Hefer, a.o. promised to be alert, but many of them are now no longer amongst us. As many of the younger collectors will never have heard about this theft, I think it will be useful, after twenty years, to warn potential buyers. . .

Enclosed is a photocopy of an advertisement in a 1996 issue of Merkur Revue. I sent the same letter to our German, Czech and Dutch stamp friends. Maybe these two treasures will once again show up. . . ?

Midpex 2011 -Tony Moseley-

Horní Bříza

First written mention of the town was around 1180 and the local Monastery followed around 40 years later. Horní Bříza's appearance changed little over the years until the great fire in 1865 which was soon followed by the construction of the railway line. In the 1880's Kaolin deposits were discovered and a mining entrepreneur called Johann Fitz helped exploit the resource. Because of the Kaolin find, ceramic goods manufacturing soon followed and the surrounds rapidly expanded to accommodate the workforce.



The area around Plzeň was liberated by the American Army on 5th May 1945.

The following was produced and signed by Mr A. Pavlíčko of Prachatice:

The origins of the manufacture of this overprint can be traced to illegal (as far as the occupying forces were concerned) meetings of the National Committee (Národní Výbor – NV) in Horní Bříza, during late March and early April 1945. My father, Alois Pavlíčko was a member of NV and he had been the Postmaster in Horní Bříza since the spring of 1937. In this post he had managed to ensure adequate communications between the NV, its members and other localities. The idea behind the overprint was to deface the emblem of the Protectorate, show new found freedom and express the joy of liberation.

I was then 15 years old and my father dedicated his efforts to producing an overprint. There was little material to be had and it was risky to hold anything that was against the Protectorate so my father applied his mind to finding a viable solution that would satisfy the ideals expressed by the NV. Initial thoughts went towards the making of blocks of metal in large quantities to form a printing plate, however it was obvious that military operations were getting closer to the town and in the haste it was decided to resort to a rubber hand-stamp. My father was aware from the start that long-term use of rubber hand-stamps led to degradation although this could be moderated by using ink without oil as an ingredient.



To date nothing has been published about the hand-stamp. After use my father kept it for a short period to prevent illegal usage. The hand-stamp is derived from a pre-war child's Post Office game which included a hand-stamp showing the State Emblem (1929 - 1931) and the word Československo. For the intended purpose this was very handy. The design fitted the Protectorate stamps in use at that time and the shape of overprint was decided during April 1945 (Fig. 1).

Overprinting stamps started on 5th May 1945 at the post office in Horní Bříza and was immediately applied to all denominations held at the post office. Each stamp had its overprint applied individually, quite a task. This was a small gesture but it worked. The stamps were on sale not only at the post office, but also at the tobacconist in the city, and the cafeteria of HOB (the ceramic manufacturing plant). It was also applied to stationery and postcards (both single & double). The Hitler head series of stamps were overprinted as were the St Vitus' Cathedral set.



20 h Newspaper stamp.

Newspaper stamps were not overprinted until the second half of May when they were produced as a loyalty emblem at the newspaper office (Fig. 2).

Overprints were produced in different colours. They were two reasons for this: to provide a suitable contrast to the colour of the postage stamp; the acute shortage of inks without an oil base. The colours applied I do not remember now, nor do I recall whether any records were kept on the types and quantity of stamps overprinted. I also do not know if there was a written authorization to sanction the execution of this overprint.

So overprinting started on 5th May and continued on and off until 15th May when all available stock was exhausted. However overprinted stamps were used after this date - I believe until the 23rd May. The overprints were postally used from 5th May and the cancellers at the office were modified at the workshops of HOB on this date. Mail was taken by a postman to Plzeň, sometimes with the help of the local police (Fig. 3 & Fig. 4).

Stamps in possession of the population had overprints added to them when they were handed in at the postal counter or collected from selected mailboxes. Other locations produced different overprints and members of the public who had the head of Hitler defaced in other ways (cork or rubber stamp) had their correspondence accepted. A considerable amount of stamps were sold to members of the NV and the local Partisans during Mav.

The overprint was destroyed in early June 1945, when it was much worn. All stamps held by the post office in Horní Bříza were returned for credit.

VELKÁ CENA MASARYKOVA (Czechoslovakia Grand Prix)

During the 1930s the Czechoslovakian Grand Prix was held at the Masaryk circuit in Brno. Of these seven GPs four have been celebrated with the issuing of special hand stamps in 1933, 1934, 1935, and 1937. Figures 1,2,3 and 4 show the four hand stamps issued to commemorate these four races.



Several code letters and different inks were used the table below gives the control letters and colours used for these various hand stamps.

History of the races

The 1933 race was held over seventeen laps of the 29.142 Km circuit (Fig 4) and the race was won by Louis Chiron driving an Alfa Romeo who completed the 17 laps in 4hours 50min and 22.8 secs. Antonio Brivio (Fig 5) completed only 4 laps.

The 1934 race again over 17 laps and was won by Hans Stuck driving an Auto Union in a time of 3 hrs 53min 27.9secs. Tazio Nuvolari (Fig 6) finishing third driving a Maserati 3mins 46.2secs behind the winner.

The 1935 race again over 17 laps was won by Bernd Rosemeyer driving an Auto Union in a time of 3hrs 44min and 10.6 secs. Tazio Nuvolari (Fig 6) was second 6mins 37.8secs behind with Antonio Brivio (Fig 5) fourth 8mins 1.4secs behind the winner.







In 1937 the race was reduced to 15 laps and was won by Rudolf Caracciola (Fig 7) in a time of 3hrs 9mins 25.3secs driving a Mercedes-Benz. Tazio Nuvolari (Fig 6) driving an Alfa Romeo finishing 5th completing 14 laps and Antonio Brivio (Fig 5) also driving an Alfa Romeo finishing 6th also completing 14 laps.

A special folder (Fig 8) was produced for the 1937 race which also shows the route of the track.

No more races were held in the 1930s with the final Grand Prix race being held in 1948 won by Peter Whitehead of the United Kingdom driving a Ferrari.


The day the Russians arrived! - 8 May 1945 Německy Brod


At first glance, this Czech-language card from a company in Deutsche Brod (Německy Brod, now renamed Havlíčkův Brod) selling tea seems unremarkable. This postcard is interesting for several reasons. The date 8 May 1945 is significant, as the Red Army were operating nearby. This town was bypassed by combat units belonging to the 4th. Guards Army of the 4th Ukrainian Front (Petrov), who were advancing at speed towards Prague. The German garrison held on, before surrendering to rearguard elements on 10 May 1945.

The card is personally addressed to the owner of the tea company, in Prague. No message is written on the reverse side. Why would anyone go to the trouble of sending a blank card, with the Russians on the doorstep? This may in fact be some kind of prearranged signal, indicating that liberation was close and that the business had survived the German occupation. With the end of the war in sight, it is difficult to speculate the purpose of this item, some seventy years later. No indication is shown, that the card ever reached Prague.

60h franking (internal postcard rate) with 1942 Hitler head issue. B-lingual German cancel DEUTSCH BROD 2 – NĚMECKÝ BROD 2, -8.V.45.15. "d".

Note, Deutsch Brod – Německý Brod was a German-speaking enclave, with a high proportion of miners. Since 1945, when the German speakers were expelled, the town has been renamed Havlíckův Brod. The word Brod means "ford" in the Czech language.

Design: a family of European hamsters. The European hamster (Cricetus cricetus), a relative of the vole, is nocturnal, hibernates in underground chambers in winter and feeds on grain, seeds, insects and young nestlings. The female can produce 2 - 5 litters per year with 3 – 12 young in each.

FDC: printed DS in brown black with commemorative Praha cancel. The cachet drawing has an adult with two young hedgehogs.

A booklet with strip of five stamps was issued. The cover has the same design as issued stamp. The back cover gives details of the animal and philatelic information.

15 June 2011 European Florists Championship – Europa Cup 2011

Designer: Vlasta Matoušová

Engraver: (FDC only) Miloš Ondráček

Printing: multi-coloured offset with linear drawing in sheets of 50.

Design: an ikebana of mainly red callas. These championships take place every four years in one of the member countries of the European Federation of Professional Florist Associations (Florint). It was formed in Strasbourg in 1956 with the first competition in 1967. It will be held in the Czech Republic for the first time from 31 August to 5 September 2011. **FDC:** printed DS in blue black with commemorative Haviřov cancel. The cachet drawing is an arrangement of lilies.




Printing: DS and offset in commemorative sheets of 1 stamp

Design: stamp has portraits of S M Daxner and J Francisci and between them a chained young man representing Slovakia with an angel representing freedom tearing the chains. The sheet has several portraits of men present at the Martin Assembly held 6-7 June 1861. The lower part of the sheet has a winged figure walking forward into the future of a free Slovak nation. The National Assembly of 1861 in Martin drew up a memorandum to obtain some autonomy within the Austro-Hungarian Empire and for acknowledgement of their identity. This was not recognised by the Hungarian Diet or Emperor. The ideas were the basis of political programmes until 1938.

FDC: printed DS in grey-brown with a commemorative Martin cancel. The cachet drawing portrays an eagle as a symbol of freedom and independence with a group of people.

The cachet is a face on view drawing of an Aero 30.


0.80Euros: a Tatra 8 model which was produced from 1936 to 1950. With its modern design lines, comfort and advanced engine it was a new concept in car manufacture. It was exported to many parts of the world. **FDC:** printed DS in black with commemorative Bratislava cancel. The cachet design has two engineer's drawings of the model.

29 July 2011 Personalities: Ján Cikker
